Today the City Campus of Erie Community College is located in the building which was the original Federal Building and Court House in Buffalo. The cornerstone was laid on June 19, 1897 and the building was dedicated March 20, 1901. The cost for the building and the site was listed at \$2,033,00 in 1902.

The Architect, Jeremiah O'Rourke, was greatly influenced by Architect H. H. Richardson's Alleghany Courthouse in Pittsburgh. The skylighted central court is one of Buffalo's most impressive interior spaces, and the tower in the center of the main front rises 230 feet above the sidewalk.

The Western District of New York of the United States District Court was created in 1900, and moved to the the fourth floor of this new building in 1901. Other federal government organizations, including the Postal Service, U.S. Customs, and U.S. Immigration occupied the remaining floors of the building.
